1. Increase in FOREX Earnings

There are many regions which lack economic strength but have very attractive places to stimulate tourists. So these areas get benefits from the government because they invest to enhance their beauty and bring them into limelight.

Cons of Tourism for Indian Economy

1. Adverse Effect on Host Region

Visitor behavior may have a bad impact on quality of life of the host community. For example, crowding and congestion, drugs and alcohol problems, prostitution and increased crime levels can occur. Tourism can even infringe on human rights, with locals being displaced from their land to make way for new hotels etc.

2. Adverse Impact on Environment

Tourism also can have adverse impact upon the environment in various ways like:

- Water pollution: improper system of hotels etc. to dispose- of the wastes into river waters can lead to harmful effects on precious water resource. Recreational and tourist transportation motor boats in surface water result in pollution in river, lakes and sea water due to spilling oil and gas and cleaning their bilge in water.
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- Noise pollution: regions which have more tourists' attractions are found to be having more noise pollution of residents as well as caused by tourist vehicles.

3. Adverse Impact on Economy

- Inflation: foreign tourists agrees to overpay for the goods which in return leads to the rise in prices of respective commodities which makes it difficult for the residents to buy those goods as those goods become the products for foreign tourists or rich class only.
- Unbalanced growth of regions: sometimes the whole tourists focus concentrates towards particular regions only which hinders the growth at a balanced level because that area deprives of its development and growth.
- Prioritizing foreigners over residents: because of the focus directed towards foreigner tourists, facilities are also concentrated for the benefit of tourists only but the local residents of that area may have to suffer. Like providing water and electricity services to tourists smoothly at a cost of residents' comfort.

Various Issues and Challenges in Indian Tourism Industry.

India has all the right ingredients - good food, rich culture, beautiful historic monuments, spirituality, and diversity, in short all the possible attractions to attract the tourists but why does it still lack behind other famous tourist places like Malaysia, Thailand, and Dubai etc.

It is because they have some qualitative aspects which India does not have. Some of those issues are as follows:

1. Accommodation Facilities

According to global hospitality consultancy, HVS, India is expected to bolster its hotel room capacity by 54,000 over the next three to four years.

There is less focus on accommodation facilities in budget which discourages the tourists because either they have to pay high or to compromise with the quality of hotels.

2. Safety and Security Issues

After the Delhi gang rape case of 23 year old woman various other cases came into limelight due to which it created a bad image among foreign citizens of India. India tour operators reported a 25 percent drop in business over the first quarter of 2013 due to this reason. Not only women, but the ever remained terrorists fear on tourists scares people.

One of the instances was that of terrorist attack at Taj Hotel, Mumbai 26/11. It created a very unsafe image of Indian tourism.

3. Under Developed Infrastructure

No doubt there is development in the infrastructure but still there is a lot of improvement needed for that. For examples- modes of transportation, electricity, and water supply, sewage and telecommunication etc. infrastructure need to be developed. One of the instances was that of terrorist attack at Taj Hotel, Mumbai 26/11. It created a very unsafe image of Indian tourism.

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5. Business Hurdles

With the ever changing visa rules related to documentation and other things, it creates inconsistency among the system which discourages the tourists. Also the tourism business faces difficulties due to the above problems. However airports have been expanded to reduce the inconvenience to the tourists. There is also the lack of on arrival visa system which is provided by other countries.

6. Taxation

India is a high-taxed country which makes the tourism in India expensive. Various types of taxes are imposed upon the tourists like service tax, luxury tax, tax on transportation etc. which discourages the tourists.

7. Lack of Residents' Interest

Even the residents of India give more priority to other countries to travel rather than travelling to destinations in India because it fails to attract them as much as foreign countries can.

8. Manpower

We have a serious mismatch of demand and supply of manpower in tourism sector because of shifting of most of the human resources in banking, retail and BPO etc. Shortage of tourism training infrastructure, qualified trainers, and lack of proper strategies and policies for human resource development also affect the industry a lot.

9. Lack of Proper Amenities

Basic amenities such as drinking water, well maintained and clean waiting rooms and toilets, first aid and wayside such as lounge, cafeteria, and parking facilities etc. are the facilities which can't be overseen. They need to be properly managed.

Suggestions

- More budgeted accommodation services must be provided
- Security must be tightened so that tourists may feel safer
- Stability in policies must be there
- More promotion of Indian heritage

Stimulations must be provided to attract competent personnel in this industry

In the end, it can be concluded that tourist sector is as important for the Indian economy as other sectors. It is a rising industry if taken into right direction can make India a successful and attractive tourist destination.
